TIME TO BREATHE: B.C. lifts mask mandate, Vaccine passport mandate to go by April 8

VICTORIA - As of Friday, March 11, 2022, B.C.'s indoor mask order is being repealed along with eased restrictions on long-term care visitors, faith gatherings and overnight camps for children and youth. Additional COVID-19 restrictions, including the BC Vaccine Card requiring proof of vaccination will be lifted on April 8.

Effective March 11, 2022, at 12:01 a.m., the following changes will be made to public health orders:

- * Face coverings order: Face coverings will be optional for people in all indoor public settings. People may want to continue wearing a mask based on personal choice.
 * Individual businesses and organizations can choose to continue
- * Individual businesses and organizations can choose to continue to require mask wearing on their premises.
- * Gatherings and events for faith gatherings: The requirement of faith communities to restrict attendance based on vaccination status is no longer required.
- * Indoor common area mask requirements for employees as part of the Workplace Safety Order will no longer be required. Employers may choose to continue to require wearing masks for operational reasons or in certain settings.
- * Overnight camps for children and youth order requirements: COVID-19 safety plans are no longer required to be submitted to a medical health officer for

overnight camps.

* Masks are encouraged on public transit and BC Ferries but are no longer required under public health order.

Changes are also coming to B.C.'s long-term care facilities. By March 18, the number of visitors to long-term care facilities will no longer be restricted as long as visitors are fully vaccinated and screened. Some facilities will be able to implement these changes earlier. Visitors should check with their local care home. "Vaccines are the primary tool in our toolbox for managing COVID-19 in the long term and people have stepped up in a big way to get vaccinated, which has made a huge difference in creating high levels of immunity and protection across the province," said Dr. Bonnie Henry, B.C.'s provincial health officer. "As we move through this transition period and lift restrictions, we encourage people to respect the comfort levels of those around them."

COVID-19 guidelines are being adjusted to advise that mask use is no longer required when K-12 students return from spring break. Dates for return from spring break vary by school district. Similarly, public health is working with the child care sector to revise guidelines. However, students and staff are supported to continue to use masks and other layers of protection based on their own comfort and risk factors.

Easing restrictions is based on ongoing and careful review of data by the provincial health officer and the BC Centre for Disease Control (BCCDC). This includes Masks no longer required in public indoor settings



a significant decrease in weekly hospital admissions (from 877 to 391) and 34% decrease in critical care admissions (from 121 to 80) in the past month.

In addition, effective April 8, 2022, at 12:01 a.m., the following changes will also be made to public health orders:

- * Showing the BC Vaccine Card proof of vaccination to access non-essential events, services and businesses will no longer be required.
- * Individual businesses and orga-

nizations can choose to continue to require the BC Vaccine Card proof on their premises.

- * The remainder of the Workplace Safety Order will be lifted, which means businesses will transition back to communicable disease plans to reduce risk of all communicable disease.
- * The requirement for students residing in residence to be fully vaccinated under the Post-secondary Institution Housing COVID-19 Preventative Measures Order will be repealed.

Canucks Sign Surrey's Arshdeep Bains to Entry Level Contract

Vancouver Canucks General Manager Patrik Allvin announced that the club has signed Surrey, BC's Arshdeep Bains to an entry level contract.


Bains, 21, has appeared in 55 games for the Red Deer Rebels of the Western Hockey League (WHL) this season collecting 82 points (30-52-82) and 46 penalty minutes. He leads the league in both points (82) and assists (52), becoming the first player

of South Asian descent to lead the WHL in points.

This season, the 6'1", 184-pound left winger collected 11 power play goals and 24 assists on the man advantage to help the Rebels boast the third-best power-play percentage in the league.

Arshdeep becomes the fourth player of Punjabi descent to sign an NHL deal after Jujhar Khaira, Robin Bawa and Manny Malholtra.

Jaskirat Singh Sidhu loses first bid to stay in Canada

Jaskirat Singh Sidhu former truck driver who caused the deadly Humboldt Broncos bus crash has lost a first step in his effort to stay in Canada, reported The Canadian Press.

Sidhu tried to make the case to the Canada Border Services Agency to stay in the country after serving his prison sentence.

His lawyer, Michael Greene, says that the agency has rejected Sidhu's submission, and his client is "devastated."

Canada Border Services referred questions to Immigration Cana-

A spokeswoman for Immigration Canada says the matter has been referred to the immigration division for an admissibility hearing, which would make the decision on deportation, but it has not yet



been scheduled.

Sidhu was sentenced to eight years after he pleaded guilty to dangerous driving causing death and bodily harm in the April 2018 crash that killed 16 people and injured 13.

Court was told Sidhu, a newly married permanent resident, went through stop sign at a rural Saskatchewan intersection and drove into the path of the Humboldt Broncos bus carrying players and staff to a junior hockey league playoff game.

Health-Care workers, ECEs to be given priority access under BC **Provincial Nominee Program**

ICTORIA –Responding to the crucial need for more health-care workers and early childhood educators (ECEs), BC is announcing changes to B.C. Provincial Nominee Program (PNP).

The changes will be implemented for the B.C. Provincial Nominee Program (PNP) Skills Immigration stream and prioritize health-care workers and ECEs in the application process and will increase the number of people nominated in these occupations for permanent residence. The B.C. PNP Skills Immigration stream supports employers to meet their workforce needs and complements B.C.'s Economic Plan.

Health-care assistants are newly eligible to apply for the PNP program, and along with ECEs, they will now be given priority access. This change will give people with these skill sets a better chance for acceptance under the program's eligibility crite-

"Health-care assistants who support seniors in long-term care, assisted living and in their homes are among the most in-demand occupations in British Columbia, both today and for years to come," said Terry Lake, CEO, BC Care Providers Association.

The Province is also expanding the health authority category to include any occupation, so health authorities will be in a better position to recruit and retain workers

"The changes to expand the health authority category will significantly improve PHSA's ability to recruit and retain workforce in our specialized occupations," said Derek Menard, talent acquisition adviser, Provincial Health Services Authority

Other changes to the skills immigration categories include clarifying or adjusting criteria to align with government economic priorities and strengthening program integrity, to best support qualified applicants for success.

As the only immigration program under provincial control, the PNP enables the Province to directly select qualified, prospective immigrants and nominate them and their families for permanent residency. Priority access will be given to qualified candidates whose occupation is on this list of in-demand health occupations: Job titles

RCMP Releases Images **Of Sexual Assault Suspect**

NORTH VANCOUVER: In an effort to further their investigation, North Vancouver RCMP are releasing images of a suspect in a sexual assault in the Lynn Canyon/Lynn Headwaters area on February 13, 2002.

North Vancouver RCMP warned the public of a suspicious male who sexually assaulted a woman by groping her, on the Varley Trail in Lynn Canyon Park.The woman was exiting the Varley Loop Trail and crossing the foot bridge to Rice Lake Road at approximately 1:30 p.m. on February 13th when the suspect grabbed her buttocks from behind.

"We've been unable to identify this suspect, and so



we're now releasing these images to the public in the hope someone recognizes this individual, and can help us put a name to the face," said Sergeant Peter DeVries of the North Vancouver RCMP.

The suspect is described as:

- · Black or south Asian male
- · Medium complexion
- 25-30 years old
- 6 ft (183 cm)
- 170 lbs (77 kg)
- Thin build
- · Light growth mustache and chin hair

South Asian Male Responsible For Indecent Acts Near Surrey School

Surrey RCMP investigated the report of multiple indecent acts by the same person near a Newton school.

On March 2, 2022, Surrey RCMP received a report of a man exposing and touching himself in the bushes near Princess Margaret Secondary School. The man was observed in a wooded area to the south (rear) of the school property by a student in morning prior to school starting.

Although this is the first report to police, the suspect was observed in the same area, doing the same thing on three separate occasions in 2022 and once in 2021. All incidents occurred in the morning between 8:20 to 8:30 a.m. The investigation is ongoing and police are liaising with a forensic sketch artist.

Historic Results, People's poll: AAP sweeps 92 Punjab seats, Badals...



AAP won 92 of the 117 Assembly seats — a massive jump from the 20 seats it acquired in the last state elections. The last time any party got such a decisive victory was in 1992, when the Congress had won 87 seats amidst a boycott by the SAD.

The victory has also led to AAP claiming its arrival on the national political stage. Party incharge of Punjab affairs Raghav

Chadha declared that the party had become a national force. "Punjab voters were asked to clean Punjab with the broom (Aam Admi Party's electoral symbol) they vacuum cleaned instead." Chadha summed up the feeling not only within the AAP party but also among pollsters and the opposition parties.

Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) swept the assembly polls by wiping out the traditional political establishment and, for the first time, handing over the reins of the state to the Aam Aadmi Party. Till now, Punjab has been ruled alternately by the Congress or

the Shiromani Akali Dal. Congress was reduced to 18 seats and Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) got three seats, while Bahujan Samaj Party and an independent bagged one each. Sanyukt Samaj Morcha, the political outfit of farmer bodies, failed to make a dent. Even its leader Balbir Singh Rajewal failed to open his account.

The electoral landslide also crushed several bigwigs, including former CMs Charanjit Singh Channi, Parkash Singh Badal, Amarinder Singh and Rajinder Kaur Bhattal. Eleven of Congress' 18 cabinet ministers lost, as did the party's state unit chief Navjot Singh Sidhu.

In fact, the defeat margin of 50% of the cabinet ministers was substantially higher than their victory margins in 2017. Those who won are Sukhjinder Singh Randhawa (Dera Baba Nanak), Rana Gurjeet Singh (Kapurthala), Amrinder Singh Raja Warring (Gidderbaha), Pargat Singh (Jalandhar Cantonment), Aruna Chaudhary (Dinanagar), Sukhbinder Singh Sarkaria (Raja Sansi), and Tript Rajinder Singh Bajwa (Fatehgarh Churian). Rana Gurjeet's son, Rana Inder Partap Singh, who contested as an independent from Sultanpur Lodhi, also won.

Shahid Bhagat Singh not Bhagwant

"It's a victory of the people. They have rejected established political leadership and voted for a better future," Aam Aadmi Party's CM candidate Bhagwant Mann told The Tribune.

He said that the oath for Chief

Minister will be taken at Khatkarkalan. While giving an open invitation to everyone, Mann said that earlier the oaths used to be taken at 'Raj Bhawan' or Mehal but now these oaths have landed in villages of martyrs. "Now the oath will be taken at Khatkar Kala. The date will be announced soon." He added, "The way you have shown your love and start and end our slogans with Inqalab Zindabad which may definitely be giving peace to the soul of

Shaheed Bhagat Singh."

He also announced that from now on, no picture of the chief minister will be hung in the government offices as earlier governments in Punjab had made it a trend to hang pictures of the chief minister. Mann said that instead the pictures of Shaheed Bhagat Singh and BR Ambedkar will be hung in the offices of the Punjab government. "Earlier, the Punjab government was being run from various palaces, but now the government would be run from villages, cities and wards," said Mann.

He said Bhagat Singh got the freedom to the country whereas Dr BR Ambedkar gave us the constitution of a free country.

Mann who addressed the gathering at Sangrur in the presence of his mother and some AAP leaders including Delhi MLA, claimed that he would keep his promise of providing employment and would go with his first official signature with his green pen for giving employment. "Pehle din hare rang da pen berozgari door karan lyi challega," he said.

Earlier, Punjab used to run from Moti Mahal or Siswan farmhouse (of Capt. Amarinder), or from the tall buildings having tall gates but now Punjab will run from Mohallas, wards, cities, and villages. Both Badals – Parkash Singh Badal and Sukhbir Badal, Adesh Partap Singh Kairon, Capt. Amarinder had lost their seats. Channi had lost from both the seats and Navjot Singh Sidhu and Bikram Majithia were losing from both seats.

"I am thankful to those who voted for AAP and also to those who did not vote for AAP. Those who did not vote for AAP should not worry and think that it is not their government as CM is of the whole Punjab. We (I and Arvind Kejriwal and AAP workers) were insulted and had to face abusive language. Now their abusive language is welcome to them. We had spared them who insulted us. But now they would have to respect all 2.75 crores Punjabis.

He claimed that people would start seeing the difference and change within one month of his government. Mann said that public servants earlier used to rebuke the beneficiaries of oldage pension or other government schemes but now the system would be developed in the state under which the public servants will reach at the doorstep of such.

Increasingly Toxic And Unpredictable Illicit

Drug Supply, Primary Cause Of Deaths From Illicit Drugs

VICTORIA –Increased access to a safer supply of drugs and creation of an evidence-based continuum of care are keys to better support substance users and reduce the number of illicit drug-related deaths, recommends a panel of subject-matter experts convened by the BC Coroners Service.

The recommendations are included in a report examining the circumstances around 6,007 deaths from illicit drug toxicity between Aug. 1, 2017 and July 31, 2021. The report BC Coroners Service Death Review Panel: A Review of Illicit Drug Toxicity Deaths reveals that the primary cause of these deaths was the increasingly toxic and unpredictable illicit drug supply in the province, and that the current drug policy framework of prohibition is forcing substance users to access the unregulated market, leading to increased numbers of substance-related emergencies and deaths.

Illicit drug toxicity is the leading cause of unnatural death in B.C., accounting for more deaths than homicides, suicides, motor vehicle incidents, drownings and

fire-related deaths combined.

"This report includes realistic, actionable recommendations that the panel believes will reduce the number of people dying due to toxic, illicit drugs in our province," said Michael Egilson, death review panel chair. "We recognize that many of the timelines in the report are aggressive, but COVID-19 has demonstrated how swiftly policy-makers can act when lives are at stake - and we know that every month of inaction equates to hundreds more lives lost."

The chief coroner has forwarded each of the panel's recommendations to the relevant ministries and organizations.

Findings reviewed by the panel show:

- * deaths are increasing both in number and in rate;
- * the drug supply has become increasingly toxic:
- * more drug toxicity deaths occur among younger adults - the average age of death is 42:
- * illicit drug toxicity deaths are ranked second after cancers for potential years of life lost; Continued on page 30

She was truly the greatest teacher, a teacher of compassion, love and fearlessness. Her presence, her love, warm energy and charismatic smile will be greatly missed.



Types of Medical Malpractice Cases

Numerous Bogus Online Cryptocurrency Investment Platforms Shut Down By BC RCMP

The BC RCMP Federal Policing Cybercrime Operations Group has shut down numerous bogus online cryptocurrency investment platforms in the fight against the disturbing upward trend targeting new investors.

Cryptocurrency investments continue to rise, and criminals are actively luring rookie investors through enticing online and social media ads promising quick and high returns on investment. Over the last several months, a number of cryptocurrency investment fraud victims have reached out to the BC RCMP Federal Policing Cybercrime Operations Group regarding self-proclaimed cryptocurrency investment consultants who have defrauded them through an array of intricate online investment schemes.

Many of the victims had been lured by online ads promising immediate high returns on cryptocurrency investments, leading them to contact the cryptocurrency exchange platform to inquire about the tempting prospect of multiplying their return on investment. This is where a company representative convinced them to invest in cryptocurrency either through a third-party investment platform, or an app downloaded onto their home computer or mobile device that gave the fraudsters access to the victim's investment account.

With most of the victims being novice cryptocurrency investors, many of them sensed that the promise of immediate returns on investment were too good to be true. But with the persistent calls from the company representative encouraging them to continue to invest, while seeing their profits grow on the platform, they carried on until realizing they had been duped into transferring their savings into a fraudulent account, or defrauded through the app's access to their online wallet.

In response to the numerous cryptocurrency fraud complaints by BC residents, the BC RCMP Federal Policing Cybercrime Operations Group has aggressively pursued the offending online scammers and successfully dismantled eight associated websites, while continuing to investigate these virtual criminal networks.

While law enforcement agencies adapt and navigate through the often uncharted and unregulated territory of combatting cybercrime, prevention continues to be the most important first course of action, Superintendent Bert Ferreira, Officer in Charge of Federal Serious & Organized Crime - Border Integrity program in BC. Prevent becoming a victim of cryptocurrency fraud by paying attention to the warning signs and carefully researching your investment options through legitimate sources, such as the British Columbia Securities Commission.

If you have been a target of an investment scam, even if a financial loss did not occur, contact your local police agency, alert your trusted cryptocurrency exchange to stop all transactions on your account, and report the incident to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC) at 1-888-495-8501, or online by way of the Fraud Reporting System (FRS).

New Funding To Support Survivors Of Sexual Violence

VICTORIA - Budget 2022 reverses cuts made in 2002, supporting survivors of sexual assault with \$22 million to provide stable funding for community-based sexual assault response services. Starting in 2023-24, the Province will provide annual funding of more than \$10 million to service providers who offer victim-centred, trauma-informed, co-ordinated, cross-sector support to survivors of sexual assault.

"Sexual assault and other forms of gender-based violence have devastating impacts on survivors, and that's why government is helping people get the supports they need," said Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General. "Nearly 20 years to the day after the previous government chose to eliminate stable annual funding for sexual assault response services, we announced we're restoring this critical funding so service providers can get back to focusing on providing the care survivors need." Every week in B.C., there are an estimated 1,000 physical or sexual assaults against women. Indigenous women and girls, people of colour, 2SLGBTQ+ people and people with disabilities are disproportionately targeted.

The decision to cut stable funding to these critical services forced community-based services providers to spend their time reapplying for funding and fundraising to make up the shortfall, making it harder to provide services for survivors. The funding announced today will allow consistent provision of sexual assault services for survivors, and will support the delivery of co-ordinated, community-based emergency sexual assault response services in regions throughout the province. In the coming months, the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General will work to establish a process for allocating the new funding.

Stable funding for sexual assault centres is just one component of a multi-year action plan to end gender-based violence being developed by the Ministry of Finance's Gender Equity Office and the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General. Focused engagement will begin on March 8, 2022, to inform the ongoing development of the action plan.




Punjabi Language Education Association (PLEA) Celebrated 19th Annual International Mother Language Day

President of PLEA emphasized that at times we fail to consider the positive initiatives happening to support Punjabi and become discouraged; he stressed that the work done by other organizations on this International Mother Language Day validates that Punjabis are concerned about issues related to their language. He also shared that we need to request changes to Canada's federal policy regarding language, so that other languages besides English and French may be recognized.

Punjabi Teacher, Prabhjot Kaur, shared details about the collaboration between L.A. Matheson school and the Dhahanfamily and discussed the annual youth prize competition. She highlighted that seven story writers are awarded \$500 each, and the Punjabi stories are translated into English and French and published as a collection.

Dr. Gurnam Singh Dhillon from Toronto, Dalbir Singh from Edmonton, Sukhbir Singh Grewal from Calgary, Dr. Harjit

Singh Grewal from Calgary/ Edmonton, and Gurinder Mann from Vancouver participated in the panel discussion. In addition to sharing details about their own efforts, these panelists discussed details about Punjabi teaching in their respective regions. Through the discussion it became apparent that although the situation is different in every region, there are efforts being made in all areas. A shared concern that came to light was the fact that there appears to be a lack of interest among parents for their children to learn Punjabi. All panelists seemed to outline that as a collective we need to undertake some initiatives to support Punjabi. In response to a question asked by local radio host Navjot Dhillon, Balwant Singh Sanghera shared that there are meetings being arranged with MLA Jinny Sims and MP Sukh Dhaliwal to discuss matters related to Punjabi.

In the next part of the Program, well known Pakistani poet, Tariq Malik shared a poem about Punjabi. Then, students from throughout Canada shared poems, songs, and stories, demonstrating the promise of Punjabi in the next generation. Students from Toronto included: Sukhman Singh, Avneet Kaur, Gunreet Kaur and Azad. From Calgary: Nimrat Kaur Dharni, Keerat Kaur Dharni, Prabhroop Singh Mangat, and Sukhman Kaur Sidhu. From Vancouver (UBC): Shreya Bhatia, Preet King, GurleenHeer, Gurkaran Dhillon, Tajdeep Sandhu, Karambir Dhaunsi, and Maneevak Bajaj. In addition, Prabhjot Singh presented a song. As well as entertaining the guests, these presentations encouraged everyone about the growth and development of Punjabi.

In the end, Balwant Sanghera expressed appreciation to all guests, participants, and students. Heshared words of gratitude towards the media for their support. Additionally, he thanked parents and teachers who encouraged their students and children to participate in the program; in particular, Surjit Kaur from Toronto and Sukhvir Singh Grewal from Calgary. In closing he expressed thanks to the MC for the program, KamaljitKambo.



BCREA Commercial Leading Indicator (CLI) fell to 149.7 from 150.6 in the fourth quarter of 2021, representing the second consecutive decline since the economy began recovering from the recession induced by COVID-19. Compared to the same time in 2020, the index was up by 3.8 per cent.

The CLI dropped in the fourth quarter due to declines in the financial and employment components of the index. The decline in the employment component of the index was driven by a 4.1 per cent decline in finance, insurance, and real estate (FIRE) employment and a 6.2 per cent decline in professional services employment.

Workers in sales and services occupations drove much of those declines, with workers in this subsector down 6 per cent from two years prior as the economy adjusts to the post-pandemic reality. The drop in the financial component of the index was driven by the rising spread between government and corporate borrowing rates. This spread on 3-month bonds jumped from 5 to 15 basis points in the fourth quarter as investors demanded higher risk-premia over government treasuries for lending to firms.

The economic component of the index was flat from the prior quarter. Although wholesale trade rose 0.7 per cent and manufacturing sales rose 1 per cent from



quarter three, these were offset by a 0.8 per cent decline in retail

Vancouver Gas Hits \$2 Per Litre And Taxes Are A Big Factor

Drivers in Vancouver are paying record-smashing prices at the gas pump and taxes are an extra kick in the head. Prices have hit more than \$2 per litre for regular gasoline in Metro Vancouver. That's the highest gasoline price in North America along with the highest gasoline taxes. Before readers in places such as Red Deer or Sarnia chuckle at the pipeline-blocking-moon-units getting their just desserts, they might spare a thought for the everyday people who still live in the Lower Mainland. Many hardworking people who didn't ask for these punishing pump prices.

This record high cost is cutting deep into family budgets. Because many people can't afford to live in Vancouver and housing is scarce, they commute long distances for work. Studies show that tens of thousands of people commute from places like

Chilliwack and Abbotsford into places like Maple Ridge and Burnaby in stopand-go traffic.

Driving 500 kilometres and filling up twice per week is not unusual for these folks. With prices at \$2 per litre, it costs \$140 to fill up a family sedan. Do that twice a week and it's \$280 to commute to work.

That's a bill of more than \$900 per month just to put gas in one car.

The average cost to rent a three bedroom place in Maple Ridge, Langley or Surrey clocks in at about \$3,000 per month so there's not much left over to pay for child-care, heat, insurance and inflated grocery prices.

How did we get into this unaffordable mess in British Columbia?

It's a cautionary tale involving high taxes and myopic government.

While unrest overseas is affecting the price, a litre of gasoline in Metro Van-

couver carries a tax price tag of about 73 cents.

The first carbon tax is currently 10 cents per litre. B.C.'s second carbon tax is a government fuel regulation that increases the cost of gasoline by about 17 cents per litre.

Transit taxes, excise taxes and sales tax make up the rest of the heavy load.

Combined, B.C.'s two carbon taxes cost about 27 cents per litre and add about \$20 extra to fill up a minivan.

Living in B.C. is unaffordable for many people and carbon taxes make it worse.

Premier John Horgan knows this, since his NDP team used to rail against carbon taxes back when they were in the opposition benches.

The carbon tax rakes in more than \$2 billion per year. It's not even labelled revenue neutral anymore and average working people don't get rebates.

This happens while emissions keep going



up in B.C. Horgan refuses to admit the part he plays in this mess.

International Women's Day

"I measure the progress of a community by the degree of progress which women have achieved." Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar

March 8, every year, is celebrated as International Women's Day worldwide. Certain deep-rooted customs in various cultures have hindered progress of women by considering them weak or vulnerable section of the society.

However, advancement of women has been the focus of social reformers individually and by national and international organizations collectively. The United Nations has played a vital role since its inception in improving the conditions of women.

As early as in 1946, a Commission on the Status of Women was established to deal with women's issues. In 1948, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights had affirmed that all human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights and there will not be any discrimination on the basis of, among others, gender.

However, considerable discrimination still exists against women primarily because women and girls face a multitude of constraints imposed by society, not by law. To ameliorate the conditions further the UN General Assembly adopted a Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women in 1979. The Convention came into force in 1981. The Convention lays down a number of fields where all State Parties to the Convention are required to take steps to eliminate discrimination against women which includes education, employment, health care, economic and social life, women in rural areas, equality before law and marriages and family relations. Under the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals 2015-2030, Gender Equality is one of the 17 Goals earmarked. The International Women's Decade was observed by the UN (1976-1985). During the De-



cade three Conferences were held: Mexico City (1975); Copenhagen (1980) and Nairobi (1985). The Fourth World Conference on Women held in Beijing in 1995 has greatly enhanced international awareness of the concerns of women and provided the groundwork for invaluable links between the national women's movements and the international commu-

nity.

In Canada, the first wave of feminism came in the late 19th and the early 20th centuries. It focused on increasing women's role in public life, with goals including women's suffrage, increased property rights, access to education and recognition as "persons" under the

In British Columbia, the wom-

en got the Suffrage and Ability to Hold Office rights in April 1917. The first woman elected to the House of Commons was Progressive Party candidate Agnes MacPhail in 1921.

The second wave came during the Depression and the Second World War when women were included in the workforce, especially in the Red Cross.

The Canadian Constitution, Human Rights Act and the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms have given equal rights to all Canadians irrespective of their gender. In addition to the status of equality, there are laws in place which take care of sexual harassment and violence against women. In its latest efforts, the Canadian national anthem was made gender-neutral by changing "thy sons" to "of us" in February 2018.

The history of the status of women in India has been topsy-turvy. At certain times, it was good, but most of the time it was deplorable. The Manu Smriti, known as Manav Dharma Shastra, contains at least 40 "celebrated" derogatory comments about women. One such comment is "Women who disobey orders of her lethargic, alcoholic and diseased husband shall be deserted and be deprived of her ornaments."

Tulsi Das, poet-saint, revered by many, advocated that "low-caste, drum, beast and woman deserve beating". Almost 700-year Mogul rule in India heightened the atrocities on women. Raja Ram Mohan Roy, the Arya Samaj and the Sikh religion did commendable work to give due recognition to women.

There are two lessons for the rest of Canada to learn from this stage

First, B.C. is the template for Prime Minister Justin Trudeau's federal carbon taxes. Trudeau is jacking his carbon tax up to \$170 per tonne within the next eight years and that adds 37 cents per litre of gasoline. He's also imposing a national second carbon tax later this year. So, Trudeau is planning on making all Canadians paying more than \$2

per litre for gasoline soon. Second, leaders who impose these carbon taxes will pretend their radical policies don't hurt anyone.

When everyday working people can no longer afford to drive to work and heat their homes because of the carbon taxes imposed on them by well-paid politicians. those same politicians will play dumb - hoping that voters are exactly that.







Increasingly Toxic And Unpredictable Illicit Drug...

- * Indigenous Peoples are disproportionately represented in drug toxicity fatalities; * individuals living in poverty and with housing instability are more vulnerable;
- * people with mental health disorders or poor mental health are disproportionately represented;
- * in addition to fentanyl, other substances

were also detected in most deaths;

* people had frequently accessed medical services prior

- to an illicit-drug-related death;

 * deaths are occurring throughout the province;
- * while the highest number of deaths occur in large urban centres (Vancouver, Surrey, Victoria), this issue spans beyond urban areas; and
- * smoking is the most common method of illicit drug consumption.

Sheila Malcolmson, Minister of Mental Health and Addictions, said, "This report confirms the urgency of the work underway by our government. Specifically, it calls on government to build an evidence-based continuum of care to deliver mental-health and substances services, including safer supply. And that is exactly what our government is doing."

"The panel also found that the current drug policy of prohibition was contributing to an increase in substance-related emergencies and deaths. We agree. We are treating substance use and addiction as a health-care issue, not a criminal one. We are the first and only province to apply to decriminalize people who use drugs. Decriminalization will reduce the fear and shame that keeps people silent and leads so many to hide their drug use and avoid treatment and support," she added.

CLI Dips in Fourth Quarter...

Ongoing supply chain disruptions, Omicron lockdowns and a shifting composition of consumer spending continues to hold down growth in these economic variables driving the CLI.

It is important to note that while the BC economy generally continues recovering strongly, the environment for commercial real estate remains highly abnormal

and uncertain. Although the CLI was designed to interpret specific sectoral activity and employment growth as positive indicators for commercial real estate demand, the recent strong growth of these indicators may not translate as readily into improved conditions in the commercial real estate market relative to the pre-pandemic period.
