16 New In-Demand Occupations Now Eligible For Permanent Residence

and That Includes Transport Truck Drivers!

OTTAWA, ON: Canada has announced that foreign nationals with work experience in 16 more occupations are now eligible to apply through Express Entry. The announcement comes after an update to the National Occupation Classification (NOC) that is used to track and categorize all jobs in the Canadian labour market and is updated to reflect changes in the economy and in the nature of work.

Sean Fraser, Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship, announced the implementation of the National Occupational Classification (NOC) 2021 for immigration programs managed. These changes will support o nurse aides, orderlies and pa-

under the Express Entry system. Using the new NOC categories will allow Canada to bring in global talent in high-demand sectors like health care, construction, and transportation.

Nurse aides, long-term care aides, hospital attendants, elementary and secondary school teacher assistants, and transport truck drivers are examples of some of the 16 occupations now included in Express Entry.

"We are using all of the tools at our disposal to tackle labour shortages, particularly in key sectors like health care, construction, and transportation. Canadians in need of these services, and they will support employers by providing them with a more robust workforce who we can depend on to drive our economy forward into a prosperous future. I'm thrilled to announce expanded pathways to permanent residence in Canada for these in-demand workers,' said Fraser.

Surrey Residents Need To Decide Who Polices Their City

The fact is 72 per cent of the people who voted in the municipal election did not vote for Brenda Locke, so any suggestion that there is some sort of overwhelming mandate is ridiculous – Linda Annis

Surrey: Surrey First Councillor Linda Annis is calling for a referendum that gives Surrey residents the opportunity to decide who will police their city. Annis has also written to Minister Mike Farnworth, encouraging him to call on the City of Surrey to hold a referendum on the police transition

"This issue has become too divisive, too costly, and too much like a political football," said Annis. "It's time to put an end to all of this by giving Surrey voters their say, allowing them to make the final decision about who polices our community. Doug McCallum never gave Surrey residents their say, and unfortunately, Mayor Brenda Locke seems to be headed down the same path, trying to stop the transition without including the people of Surrey. The fact is 72 per cent of the people who voted in the municipal election did not vote for Brenda Locke, so any suggestion that there is some sort of overwhelming mandate is ridiculous. Only a referendum that gives the people of Surrey their say will give the final decision on policing any

legitimacy."

Annis, who campaigned on a referendum, said voters need all the facts and the chance to make that final decision.

"This decision is so big, so costly, and so divisive that it will take a vote of our citizens to bring it to a legitimate conclusion," added Annis. "The nine of us elected to council on October 15 should not be making this final decision. We need to give Surrey voters their say, something that has been missing for four years under Doug Mc-Callum. Mayor Locke should do the right thing and let the people of our city have their say, otherwise what's the difference between her way and Doug McCallum's way of doing things? If we are an open and transparent city council, we should start by giving our voters their say on who polices our city."

South Asian truckers come out in support of Surrey police force; want RCMP officers to be hired by Surrey Police Surrey is in desperate need of change to preserve our

future as a community and as a city

SURREY, BC: If on one hand Mayor Brenda Locke and the council are suggesting SPS officers be hired by RCMP. United Truckers Association ("UTA") are requesting that policing transition to Surrey Police Service should continue and instead Surrey Police should hire the RCMP officers who will be impacted by the transition.

UTA held a vote on supporting the Surrey policing transition over the weekend, with the over 478 members in attendance voting unanimously in favour.

"After months of internal contemplation by the UTA executive, and in light of Monday night's successful Surrey City Council vote to proceed on a de-transition plan and report for Minister Mike Farnworth, the UTA decided now was the time to make a public declaration," said UTA spokesperson Gagan Singh.

It also marks the first major South Asian community organization which has offered a public endorsement of continuing the transition to a municipal police force since the recent election.

"While the UTA's membership has always been in favour of a

more local, community-based model of policing in Surrey, it was critical to set a precedent within the South Asian community," Singh said. "Too many of our young people have fallen victim to the criminal lifestyle, and Surrey is in desperate need of change to preserve our future as a community and as a city."

The UTA, however, remains appreciative and supportive of the hundreds of Surrey RCMP officers currently working locally and is concerned for these front-line officers as the transition continues.

"The UTA requests the Provincial Government continue with the approved police transition and provide certainty to the residents of Surrey in a timely manner. A municipal police service will be accountable to the residents of Surrey in ensuring adequate staffing levels and aligns with the recommendations of the report by the Special Committee on Reforming the Police

That is why the UTA is imploring the Surrey Police Board and the Surrey Police Union to consider priority hiring status for these RCMP officers, the majority of which have been attached and integrated into the local community for many years.

'Away from the divisive politics that we have seen in recent times, UTA members understand the human cost to both sides with the prospect of job loss hanging over families," added Singh. "The UTA calls on those in charge of the Surrey Police Service hiring process to consider this wealth of experience from the RCMP detachment as they continue to hire additional capacity over the coming months and years."

The UTA is proud to be a community-based South Asian organization whose Surrey-based members put public safety ahead of politics and all other considerations.

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Canada lifts limit on flights to India, allows unlimited flights between both countries

ORONTO: There is good news for Indo-Canadian travellers. The Canadian government has announced that the government will allow an unlimited number of flights from designated airlines between Canada and India. The announcement is part of the transport agreement expansion that previously limited each country to 35 flights per week.

From visiting friends and family to getting goods to markets around the world, Indo-Canadians have been struggling to book flights to and from India. The ever increasing cost of the flights have forced many Indo-Canadians to either postpone or cancel their plans to visit their loved ones.

This significant move will allow airlines of Canada and India to better respond to the needs of the Canada-India air transport market.

The Minister of Transport Omar Alghabra made the announcement at the recent conclusion of an expanded air transport agreement between Canada

Expanding Canada's existing air transport relationships allow airlines to introduce more flight options and routings, which benefit passengers and businesses by providing greater choice and convenience.

India is Canada's 4th largest international air transport market. "The expanded air transport agreement between Canada and India is a positive development for air transport relations between our countries. We are pleased to expand this relationship with additional flexibility for airlines to serve this growing market. By making the movement of goods and people faster and easier, this expanded agreement will continue to facilitate trade and investment between Canada and India and help our businesses grow and succeed," said Al-

Canada's first air transport agreement with India was concluded in 1982, and

da's Blue Sky policy, which encourages long-term, sustainable competition and the development of international air

The agreement gives Canadian air carriers access to Bangalore, Chennai, Delhi, Hyderabad, Kolkata, and Mumbai, and Indian air carriers access to Toronto, Montreal, Edmonton, Vancouver, and two additional points to be selected by India.

Air India has 14 weekly direct flights with a daily between Delhi and Toronto and another daily between Delhi and Vancouver.

"The Canada-India economic relationship is built on deep-rooted people to people ties. With this expanded air transport agreement, we are facilitating even more exchanges of professionals, students, business people, and investors. As we strengthen our trade and investment relationship with India, we will continue building bridges like this that enable our entrepreneurs, workers, and businesses to access new opportunities," said Mary Ng, Canada's Minis-



ter of International Trade. Other cities in both countries can be served indirectly through code-share services. Rights for all-cargo services are already unrestricted.



Surrey man charged in connection to uttering threats to an American journalist

Surrey RCMP approved charges in an investigation that involved death threats to an American journalist online. In June 2022, the Surrey RCMP's General Investigation Unit took conduct of the file, and identified a suspect. On July 10, 2022, a 38-year-old man was arrested and a search warrant was executed at his residence. He was released from custody on conditions.

On November 10, 2022, 38 year-old Nicholas Sullivan was charged with five counts of uttering threats to cause death or bodily harm through social media. He is scheduled to appear in court later this

Surrey RCMP worked with U.S. authorities, including the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) to bring this matter before the courts.

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Turning The Tide On The Drug Toxicity And Overdose Crisis



The toxic drug crisis is an unprecedented public health emergency that has touched the lives of people around the world and right here in British Columbia. People are passing away every day, even as countless lives are saved by the heroic interventions of first responders, frontline workers, peers, friends and family.

In B.C., the illicit drug supply is more toxic and unpredictable than ever before, causing an urgent health emergency. For too long, people have struggled to get the mental health supports they need before small challenges become big ones. We also know that for too long, substance use was treated as a criminal justice issue instead of a public health matter, making this crisis even more destructive.

This fall, the all-party Select Standing Committee on Health released our report on the drug toxicity and overdose crisis with 37 recommendations aimed at saving lives and moving British Columbia out of the current public health emergen-

Putting aside political differences, members of all elected parties in B.C. agreed on recommendations to expand access to a safer supply, implement decriminalization, and increase enforcement of organized crime that preys upon vulnerable people with an increasingly toxic supply.

It is our belief that moving out of this public health emergency will require not just policy-makers and key investments but all British Columbians to put aside any preconceived notions about this crisis and, fundamentally, to address our society's deeply held stigma to-

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wards people who use drugs. It is important to understand who is most often impacted by toxic drugs. We heard that the populations that are most affected include men aged 19-39 (77% of deaths), and people working in trades, transportation, or as equipment operators. Most deaths are also occurring when people are alone and in private residences. While the drug toxicity crisis can affect anyone, understanding these factors helps us to target solutions.

It was clear to all members that the toxic drug crisis is not - and should not – be a partisan issue and we need to work collectively to find and focus on solutions that will save lives and help people achieve wellness.

Over the course of its work, the committee received briefings from federal and provincial government ministries and agencies,



health authorities and other experts. The committee also held public hearings and invited written input to ensure all British Columbians had the opportunity to participate. The committee heard from 118 presenters and received 881 written submissions.

It was a big step forward to see all-party support for 37 recommendations to fight the overdose crisis, including evidence-based policies like safer supply and decriminalization. Each committee member comes from different parts of B.C., has different political affiliations and lived experience. Yet we all came together to build consensus and meet at our places of agreement. Ultimately, the work of this committee was an act of solidarity with all British Columbians impacted by this

B.C. is taking a comprehensive approach to addressing the ongoing public health emergency, including acting on decriminalization, adding new treatment and recovery services, and investing in new harm reduction supports, like prescribed safe supply. After decades of neglect, we are building up treatment and recovery services in B.C. to make sure help is available when someone is ready to take that step toward

We know there is more to do, and we won't stop working until we turn the tide on this crisis. It's our hope to build upon the work the province has done already and fill the remaining gaps.

over the Surrey police transition between Surrey Police service and the city's newly elected mayor Brenda Locke has become more complicated and has intensified after Surrey City Council voted to keep the RCMP.

On Monday, council voted 5-4 in maintaining the RCMP as Police of Jurisdiction in Surrey. According to the city, Council's this vote means the staff will now prepare a transition plan to be forwarded to BC's Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General.

Locke and councillors Harry Bains, Rob Stutt, Pardeep Kooner and Gordon Hepner voted in favour, while Safe Surrey Coalition councillors Doug Elford and Mandeep Nagra voted against keeping the RCMP as did Surrey First councillors Mike Bose and Linda Annis.

Locke also said that on behalf of Council, staff will be issuing a letter to the Surrey Police Board to pause all new hiring and expenditures pending further Council direction.

The Surrey Police Service however said that it won't stop hiring unless directed by the province because it remains bound to meet targets outlined in the police transition plan through May 2023.

"Until or unless we hear differently from the Province,

SURREY: The ongoing battle SPS has an obligation to continue with the deployments laid out in the plan (and the related hiring to achieve those deployments) in order to maintain public safety in Surrey," spokesperson Lisa Eason said in an email.

> SPS chief Const. Norm Lipinski also told Global News that the police board does not report directly to mayor and council, so the mayor doesn't have the authority to direct the police department to do any particular thing.

> The Surrey Police Service also hit back on the Mayor and the council by sighting inaccuracies in the corporate report that was presented to the council on the day of voting.

> "City staff have prepared a report for council's consideration without the benefit of a briefing by the SPB or SPS, which would have ensured an accurate accounting of all human resource and financial aspects of the issue," said Melissa Granum, Surrey Police Board.

> Granum mentioned that the report inaccurately reflects SPS's current staffing, citing only the 154 deployed SPS officers, which the reports notes is 21% of the "targeted strength of 734 police officers". "However, SPS has a total of 315 police officers, which represents 43% of the targeted strength. The additional 161 officers are waiting for deployment (35 at

the end of November) and/or working in administrative roles that are required for either the normal functioning of any police agency, or to develop the infrastructure for a new police service," according to Granum. According to SPS, the report also fails to highlight a number of significant financial implications for Council's consideration (see attached financial backgrounder), which include almost \$108.3 million in costs incurred to date, as of October 31st and the prospect of a massive severance liability. "Reversing the transition would result in an estimated \$188.5 million loss of investment into SPS, which is approximately six months away from being operationally ready to become the police of jurisdiction. Furthermore, our recently completed financial forecast of steady state operations projects a \$18.3M cost difference between SPS and the RCMP, which should be considered. for an informed decision. The report also inaccurately attributes the \$20.6 million policing budget shortfall to SPS, when the City previously attributed the overage to the RCMP in their Q2 2022 financial corporate report," Granum said.

While this corporate report presented to the City council is not a final plan on transition. The City staff will put together a plan to re-establish the RCMP

as the sole police force in the city that will address staffing and human resource implications. "Tonight's vote not only affirms my promise to restore Surrey RCMP as Police of Jurisdiction, but it will finally reveal the costs of the transition, which will be made available to the public," Mayor Locke said. She also added that the plan to re-establish Surrey RCMP will address a number of key elements, including the following. · Outline a plan for staffing Surrey RCMP to a full compli-

ment of 734 officers. · Outline a process to fulfil City HR obligations to impacted civilian staff and any support required for the Board to manage human resources implications

for Board employees. · Prepare planning for future increases for Surrey RCMP members to keep pace with population growth and increased calls for service.

· Prepare a plan to repurpose or otherwise dispose of equipment (vehicles, IT, use of force equipment etc.) and other assets purchased to date.


The plan will be then sent to Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General for the final approval. Farnworth, however, has made it clear in a statement that any plan would be reviewed by the Director of Police Services and himself to ensure adequate and effective policing is maintained in Surrey, and across the province.

He said, "As the Solicitor General, it's my responsibility to ensure the City of Surrey's policing plan meets the requirements of the Police Act, and that it continues to provide safe and effective policing."

"The City of Surrey must now put forward a transition plan that deals with all the components of reversing the transition, including addressing human resources issues, the capital plan, and the financial cost of the reversal. I also expect that the plan would be made public for the citizens of Surrey, so that they are aware of how the process will unfold," he added.

Staff will now be working diligently on a report as requested by the Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General for final approval. As I have said, the plan will be people-centric, which means no SPS officer or civilian staff will be left behind. Regardless of badge, we all share the common goal of keeping Surrey and its citizens

It is interesting to note that all the components mentioned by Farnworth that are important to decide the transition like human resources issues, the capital plan, and the financial cost are a bone of contention between SPS and the City council.



Province urges people to get vaccinated amidst rise in respiratory illness cases; but there is no mask mandate

VICTORIA - Public-health officials are asking all British Columbians to get their influenza and COVID-19 immunizations as soon as possible as rates of respiratory illnesses are on the rise throughout the province. But BC's top doctor has said even with rising rates of respiratory illness, especially among children, a mask mandate is not necessary at this time. "I don't believe we need that heavy hand of a mandate," said Henry. "I don't see the need for a mask mandate by itself because we have many other tools and a high level of protection."

Vaccinations remain the best defence against COVID-19 and influenza. Everyone over the age of six months can get both immunizations for free. People can book their shots through the provincial Get Vaccinated system.

While COVID-19 continues to circulate in communities, the situation has changed. In B.C., more than 90% of the population has built some immunity to the SARS-CoV-2 virus through vaccination, infection or both, and the number of people at risk for serious outcomes from COVID-19 has dropped significantly.

There are many tools to get people through this respiratory illness season. The most important is to maximize protection through vaccination. People are also encouraged to check daily for symptoms of respiratory illness, wash their hands regularly and practise respiratory etiquette. This includes wearing a mask if they have mild symptoms, covering coughs and disposing of tissues appropriately. If people have symptoms of respiratory illness, they should stay home and limit close contact with others, especially those at higher risk of developing severe illness from

COVID-19 or influenza, until they no longer have a fever (without needing fever-reducing medications) and are well enough to participate in usual daily activities.

The Province has been expecting and preparing for an increase in respiratory illnesses, such as COVID-19, influenza and respiratory syncytial virus (known as RSV), as people gather more indoors and many viruses that cause respiratory illnesses circulate more in the fall and winter.

Hospitals throughout the province have well-established systems in place to manage high patient volumes, including regional and provincial surge plans. They have been planning for various scenarios and are ready to respond to an influx of patients requiring care for respiratory illnesses.

Canada acknowledges scarcity of kids fever medication, secures additional supply

"Do not use adult fever and pain medications on children under 12 years of age unless you consult with a health care professional."

Health Canada has shared the concerns of parents and caregivers about their inability to find infant and children's acetaminophen and ibuprofen. It said that these products are essential for families, caregivers, and health care professionals to reduce fever and pain.

Health Canada issued a statement said announcing that it has secured foreign supply of children's acetaminophen that will be available for sale at retail and in community pharmacies in the coming weeks. "The amount to be imported will increase supply available to consumers and will help address the immediate situation. At this time, Canadians should buy only what they need, so that other parents and caregivers can access medication so we can meet the needs of sick children."

Each proposal received from a company to import a foreign authorized product undergoes careful review by Health Canada to confirm that the product was manufactured according to the same high quality standards the people of Canada expect.

Health Canada carefully reviewed this new proposal and found that the product was safe and effective. All information related to cautions and warnings, dosing directions, ingredients, and other important details will be made available in both English and French to ensure parents and caregivers clearly understand what medication they are using and how to give to their children. This work is being done in parallel to obtaining the additional foreign supply.

To further increase supply, Health Canada also recently approved the exceptional importation of infant and children's ibuprofen and acetaminophen to supply hospitals in Canada. The importation of ibuprofen has occurred, and distribution has begun.

"We continue to work very closely with the manufacturers and distributors of infant and children's acetaminophen and ibuprofen products, provinces/territories, children's hospitals, the Canadian Pediatric Society, the Canadian Pharmacists Association and the Food, Health and Consumer Products of Canada to facilitate information-sharing along the manufacturing and distribution supply chain, and to identify and implement additional measures to alleviate this shortage."

Health Canada's top priority is the health and safety of Canadians and we are committed to exploring every possible option to end this shortage. In the meantime, if you cannot find infant or children's fever and pain medication that you need, you can speak to the pharmacist about available alternatives. Do not use adult fever and pain medications on children under 12 years of age unless you consult with a health care professional.

Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada uses NOC to determine and assess the occupational eligibility criteria under its temporary and permanent residency programs.

Employment and Social Development Canada and Statistics Canada work together to update the NOC on an ongoing basis, with major reviews occurring every 10 years, to ensure it reflects the changing labour market. The review involves in-depth research, analysis, and assessment of the feedback received through consultations and occupational research. 
On the 24th Commemoration of the assassination of newspaper editor & publisher Tara Singh Hayer

Tara Singh Hayer (Nov. 15, 1936 – November 18, 1998) was an Indo-Canadian Times newspaper editor & publisher, who was assassinated in Surrey, Canada on November 18,1998 after reporting about terrorism, he was recognized with hundreds local, provincial, national and international awards.

Some of those awards include: The Order of British Columbia, the Journalist Award by the Municipality of Surrey for courageous and outstanding contribution to Punjabi Journalism in Canada, the Commemorative Medal for the 125th Anniversary of Canada, the International Award of Distinction for Journalism from the International Association of Punjabi Authors and Artists, a Certificate of Appreciation from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP).

In 1999, Canadian Journalists for Free



Expression renamed its Press Freedom Award the "Tara Singh Hayer Press Freedom Award" in Hayer's honour. Each year, the award is given to a Canadian journalist who, through his or her work, has made an important contribution to reinforcing and promoting the principle of freedom of the press in Canada or elsewhere.

In 2000 Tara Singh Hayer's name was added to the Canadian News Hall of Fame. He was the first Canadian of non-English, non-French origin to be added to the Hall, In 2000, Hayer was also selected as one of the International Press Institute's 50 World Press Freedom Heroes of the past 50 years.

One of the presenters of the Award for Late Tara Singh Hayer as "World Press Freedom Hero" in 2000 was USA Senator Ted Kennedy https://en.m.wikipedia.org/wiki/Ted_Kennedy in Boston, USA and Award was accepted by Dave Hayer & Isabelle Martinez Hayer on behalf of the Hayer family.

> a journalist who has been courages and brought out stories of the marginalized communities.

On Friday, November 18th we commemorate Tara Singh Hayer, my father's message of freedom of expression and freedom of speech, his message against hate, violence, extremism and terrorism.

My father's life was devoted to democracy, freedom of speech, and freedom of the press to speak out against those who try to prevent those freedoms, the right that we in Canadian society hold so precious, to live and speak without fear

He believed in leading by example, and even though he knew he was putting his life in danger, he had the courage to not only speak out about his own beliefs but also speak out for victims and the innocent.


My father believed that it was not right to remain quiet while some individuals worked against our freedoms, because then they would win ... and we must never let those who promote hatred, extremism, violence and terrorism succeed.

Fear is what drives terrorism around the world, but we must stand united against that, and fight back peacefully as my father did through his newspaper and through his words. And we must have the courage, as he did,

to keep talking about, and keep fighting for our freedoms and our rights.

As a result of my father's teachings, and his example of standing up for others, I and all of my family will continue the fight for the rights of victims, for the rights of families of victims & for the rights of all law-abiding Canadians. We will continue to do all we can to ensure that the rights of victims, and our rights as law-abiding Canadian Citizen's, are stronger than the rights of those who commit crimes against us.

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BC floods displaced more than 3,300 people last year, still a long road to recovery

Mike Farnworth, Minister of Public cleared of debris, and homes and barns that were completely flooded last year released the following statement marking one year since the November 2021 atmospheric river:

"Today marks the one-year anniversary of the atmospheric river in British Columbia that flooded homes and farmlands, washed away roads and infrastructure, displaced more than 3,300 people, and tragically took the lives of five people. I share the grief and anguish of everyone affected by this disastrous

"The past year has been tremendously difficult for people recovering from this devastating flooding - waiting for support funding, insurance payments and any needed repairs. And while there have been many challenges, British Columbians and communities have come together to support each other during these unprecedented circumstances

"Last week, I travelled through the Fraser Valley, met with First Nations and local governments, and visited with homeowners, farmers and small business owners affected by last year's atmospheric river. I was impressed by how much progress had been made in repairs and rebuilding efforts. Rivers have been are now standing strong and operational. Even more so, I was inspired by people's resiliency and perseverance.

"We have made significant progress as a province - from rebuilding highways to clearing nearly all debris, and from repairing dikes to providing more than \$24 million in Disaster Financial Assistance to people, small businesses and charitable organizations. Last week, I was happy to announce that the Sumas River main dike is being permanently repaired with \$1.6 million in Disaster Financial Assistance funding. Repairs are expected to be complete by the end of the month. There is much to be proud of, and yet I recognize there is much work still to do. "We must continue to adjust to the reality of climate change. That means better flood planning and mapping, and that work is underway through the B.C. Flood Strategy. That means more funding for communities to mitigate disaster risks through programs like the Green Infrastructure Adaptation, Resilience and Disaster Mitigation program and the Community Emergency Preparedness Fund. It also means modernizing our emergency management legislation,

which we're co-developing with First Nations, Treaty Nations and Métis leaders.

"We know that recovery will take years and that we cannot do it alone. We look forward to continuing to work in partnership with First Nations, and local and federal governments. We will continue to persevere and work to build back better, together."

The Province will continue to carefully monitor respiratory illnesses in B.C., across the country and around the globe, and adapt the responses and measures in place as needed to protect public health.

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British-Sikh Taxi Driver Murdered On Duty In UK

A 35-year-old man has been charged with murder after a British-Sikh taxi driver died following an assault in Wolverhampton, central England.

Anakh Singh, 59, was found with serious injuries in Nine Elms Lane of the city while on duty as a driver for a private hire taxi company and died of his injuries.

West Midlands Police said Tomasz Margol has been charged with murder and appeared before Wolverhampton Magistrates Court earlier this month. A post-mortem was carried out but the results were inconclusive.

"We've kept Mr Singh's family updated with this development as officers continue to



support them during this tragic time," said Detective Inspector Michelle Thurgood from the West Midlands Police Homicide Team.

"We continue to appeal to anyone with information who has not yet been in touch to contact us," she said. An online fundraising campaign was launched for Singh's family with a target of 2,000 pounds to help them following the tragic killing. The Just Giving fundraiser has since far surpassed that target to raise over 11,000 pounds.

"Anakh Singh, private hire driver was at work driving his taxi when he lost his life," reads the fundraiser page.

"This is an awful time for his family, our thoughts are with his family. The donations will go directly to Anakh's family to help support them at this difficult time. We have hit the original target, let's keep going," it adds.

We Need to Earn Minimum of \$24.08 an Hour In Metro Vancouver To Support Family

Living wages increase across BC due to 40-year inflation high & rising costs of living, especially housing

VANCOUVER - The living wage has gone up to \$24.08 an hour in Metro Vancouver for 2022—the highest increase since the living wage was first calculated in 2008 and significantly higher than the rate of inflation, this year's Living Wage Update report shows.

And for the first time, Victoria's living wage, \$24.29 an hour, is higher than Metro Vancouver's because of the increased cost of food on Vancouver Island.

The living wage is the hourly wage that two parents working full-time need to earn to support a family of four. In Kelowna it is \$4.39 (23.7 per cent) higher than last year's rate

of \$18.49, in Victoria it is \$3.83 (18.7 per cent) higher than last year's \$20.46 and in Metro Vancouver it is \$3.56 (17.3 per cent) higher than last year's \$20.52.

This year the living wage has increased across BC in all of the communities where it has been calculated in the past and is driven by two essentials that every family needs: food and shelter.

"With general inflation shooting up to a 40-year high this year, and with the cost of food rising even faster and rent increasing everywhere, especially for families that need to move and are no longer protected by rent control, it's not surprising to

see such big increases this year," says Anastasia French, Living Wage for Families provincial manager.

The price of groceries needed for a healthy diet for a family with two young children has spiked sharply this year, according to the latest BC food costing survey data.

In Metro Vancouver, food costs \$1,114 per month, an increase of \$161 per month or 16.9 per cent since last year. Food is the second-highest cost for families in most communities, only exceeded by the cost of housing. Food used to be the third most expensive item for the living wage family, but edged ahead of child care costs after the BC government made major investments in child care affordability in 2018 that significantly reduced outof-pocket child care costs for the living wage family, French says. "Until this year the living wage across most of BC remained below its 2018 peak because policy changes introduced by the BC provincial government significantly improved affordability for families with young children and offset increases in the cost of food, housing and other essentials," says report lead author Iglika Ivanova, senior economist at CCPA-BC.

"However, the savings generated by these policy changes, including significant child care investments and the elimination of MSP premiums, have now been effectively wiped out by ballooning rent and food costs," she adds.

Increases in child care fees were low this year, rising on average less than one per cent over last year, with costs reduced to an average \$892 per month in Metro Vancouver because of the BC Affordable Child Care Benefit. While these public investments have helped improve affordability for families, the rising cost of other essentials have made it harder for families to manage.

The living wage is enough for a family with two young children to cover necessities, support the healthy development of their children,

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BC Home Sales Remain Slow While Active Listings Plateau

/ANCOUVER, BC: The British Columbia Real Estate Association (BCREA) reports that a total of 5,242 residential unit sales were recorded by the Multiple Listing Service® (MLS®) in October 2022, a decrease of 45.5 per cent from October 2021. The average MLS® residential price in BC was \$932,979, a 3.1 per cent decrease from \$963,011 recorded in October 2021. Total sales dollar volume was \$4.9 billion, a 47.2 per cent decline from the same time last year. "Sales activity remains



slow across the province and inventories appear to be plateauing," said BCREA Chief Economist Brendon Ogmundson. "While prices have fallen from peak levels reached in early 2022, average prices have recently leveled

Year-to-date, BC residential sales dollar volume was down 26.3 per cent from the same period in 2021 to \$73.3 billion. Residential unit sales were down 33 per cent to 72,824 units, while the average MLS® residential price was up 10 per cent to \$1.01 million.

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



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Teach students how to think—not what to think

In school, children should learn basic facts to help them become critical thinkers. Not only should high school graduates be knowledgeable and skillful, they should also be able to think for themselves.

While everyone generally agrees with the importance of promoting critical thinking, there's significant disagreement over how to get there. A common sentiment in schools nowadays is that teachers should focus on social justice, which means training students to become politically active so they can change the world.

Swedish activist Greta Thunberg is a role model for many in this crowd. By skipping school to engage in "climate" strikes, Thunberg became world famous and many teachers and their unions endorsed climate strikes in Canada. But some teachers go even further and use their classroom time to turn students into environmental activists. This can include everything from making students engage in extended "climate change" action projects to taking students to protest rallies.

This type of activism sometimes pervades entire schools. Last year, an elementary school in rural Saskatchewan posted a message on its outdoor sign stating that chemicals used in farming "hurt habitats & species." Needless to say, this message did not go over well in the predominantly farming community.



After parents chimed in with their feedback, the sign was quickly changed.

It's not just environmental issues where politics enter the classroom. So-called "antiracist" teachers encourage students to see everything through the prism of race. Students are classified as "privileged" or "oppressed" based solely on their skin colour. Far from promoting racial equality, this type of indoctrination leads to more divisions between students

The same is true of teachers who want everyone to think the same way about gender and sexuality. Ignoring the fact that public schools serve students from all backgrounds, including families with more traditional views, these teachers will settle for nothing less than everyone thinking the same way about these issues.

There are 13 Foundry centres open throughout the province in Vancouver-Granville, North Shore (North Vancouver), Campbell River, Ridge Meadows, Abbotsford, Kelowna, Prince George, Victoria, Penticton, Terrace, Comox Valley, Langley and Richmond.

An additional 10 new Foundry centres are in development in Burns Lake, East Kootenay (Cranbrook), Port Hardy, Sea to Sky (Squamish), Surrey, Cariboo-Chilcotin (Williams Lake), Fort St. John, Tri-Cities, Kamloops and

escape severe financial stress and par- Living wage emticipate in the social, civic and cultural lives of their communities. It affords a decent but still very modest standard of living, without the extras many take for granted, French explains.

A strikingly large gap exists between the 2022 living wages for communities across BC and the province's minimum wage (currently \$15.65 per hour).

While many BC employers see the value of paying living wages (with nearly 400 certified Living Wage Employers across the province). Ivanova explains the labour market alone cannot solve all problems of poverty and social exclusion.

"Good public policy can make life more affordable for families and when government transfers don't keep up with the rising cost of living, the families hardest hit are headed by already marginalized earners, including single mothers, Indigenous people and recent immigrants," she says.

ployers include small businesses, non-profit organizations, unions and cooperatives. Fourteen local governments have adopted living wage policies as of October 2022, including the cities of Burnaby, Langley, New Westminster, North Vancouver, Pitt Meadows, Port Coquitlam, Quesnel, Vancouver and Victoria.

These employers have committed to pay all their direct staff and contract employees a living wage and to require their major service providers to also pay a living wage, including for janitorial, security and food service contracts.

All of us must work long and hard to ensure that Canadian Laws protect the rights of victims, rights of the victims' families and the rights of all innocent individuals

speaking out, by being strong and unafraid of threats can we win the fight against terrorism, hatred and violence. We all need to work together. We all need to be united in achieving those goals. Only then we will be truly free, and truly able to live in a society where our rights are equal.

Transforming society through films: The life and cinema of V. Shantaram

inema can be a powerful medium for social transformation and no one gauged it better than the legendary V. Shantaram who used his memorable films to attack the malaise of untouchability and caste, forced marriages of young women to (rich) old men, dowry, communalism and regionalism, as well as to humanise policemen, prostitutes, and convicts.

And, he was not deterred when any of his courageous films ran afoul of vested interests.

When his "Apna Desh (Hindi)/ Nam Nadu (Tamil)" (1949), an eloquent appeal against the deepening fault-lines threatening to destabilise the newly-independent country, faced an ill-informed and easily-swayed public and a malicious media campaign, there were powerful backers to ensure it faced no problems. These were

no less than Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel and Morarji Desai, the then home ministers of India and Bombay state, his daughter recounted in his autobiography.

Far ahead of his times but constantly re-inventing himself, Shantaram Rajaram Vankudre, or V. Shantaram as he was popularly known, was a pioneer of not only path-breaking films in Marathi and Hindi, but the Indian film industry itself, seeing its journey from silent to "talkies". from black and white to colour. from depicting mythology and historical episodes to reflecting the immense diversity of contemporary life and society and the infinite spectrum of the human imagination.

Born on this day (November 18) in 1901 in the then princely state of Kolhapur, he started his film career in 1920 by doing odd

jobs on sets of the Maharashtra Film Company, but came to the forefront when drafted at the last minute to portray Lord Vishnu in "Surekha Haran" (1921).

That started his epic journey. Directing his first film "Netaji Palkar" in 1927, he founded the Prabhat Film Company in Pune along with his friends in 1929 which produced the first Marathi film "Ayodhyecha Raja" in 1932 under his direction.


Under his direction, Prabhat Films went on to to make "Maya Machindra" (1932), "Sairandhri" (1933) -- India's first colour film, processed and printed in Germany, "Amrit Manthan" (1934) about a reformist king who bans the sacrifice of animals and humans in his kingdom and the first Indian film to celebrate a silver jubilee!, "Sant Tukaram" (1936), "Kunku"/ "Duniya Na Mane"

(1937) about a forced marriage between an elderly man and a teenaged woman, and "Aadmi (Hindi)/ Manoos(Marathi)" (1939) about a doomed love affair between a police constable and a prostitute.

Before leaving Prabhat in 1942 to set up his own "Rajkamal Kalamandir", Shantaram made "Shejari (Marathi)/Padosi(Hindi)" (1942)

about how outsiders stir up trouble between peacefully-living communities for their vested interests - and noted for actor Mazhar Khan playing the role of Pandit and Gajanan Jagirdar playing Mirza.

Prabhat did not long survive Shantaram's exit and was soon wound up - with its Pune premises now playing host to the Film and Television Institute

ensure all students including those who identify as LGBTQ+ are treated with respect. However, teachers should not pressure students to abandon their religious convictions. Classrooms should be safe for all students, not just those with progressive values.

The correct approach is quite obvious. Instead of indoctrinating students or pushing them to take a particular political or ideological position, teachers should make classrooms as neutral as possible and not push their personal views and political preferences on students.

For example, a student whose parents work in the oil sector should not be forced to attend environmental protest rallies by a teacher who opposes the petroleum industry. Similarly, students from traditional Muslim or Christian homes should not be pressured to abandon their views about sexuality, marriage and family.

Obviously, it's important to There is plenty for teachers to do without pushing their opinions and values on their students. All students must learn how to read, write and acquire fundamental knowledge about science and history. None of this requires political or ideological indoctrination.

> If students decide on their own to become passionate about a cause, that's great. There's nothing wrong with students joining environmental clubs. starting gay-straight alliances or engaging in other forms of activism. But students must be allowed to make these decisions on their own.

> In the end, classrooms should be politically neutral. Teachers should provide students with the fundamental knowledge and skills they need to be successful, then let students decide for themselves what they want to do with it. In other words, teach students how to think, not what to think.

> Teachers who want to be politically active should do so on
